The Government of Kenya has received financing in the amount of US\$ 257.5 Million equivalent from the World Bank towards the cost of the Kenya Electricity Modernization Project (KEMP), and it intends to apply part of the proceeds to payments for goods, works, related services and consulting services to be procured under this project.

The project will include the following components:

- a) Component A: Improvement in Service Delivery and Reliability
- b) Component B: Revenue Protection Program
- c) Component C: Electrification Program
- d) Technical Assistance and Capacity Building

The above include Procurement of the following goods, works and services:

- a) Purchase of remote terminal units and associated communication equipment, line isolators, equipment and tools for live line maintenance, advance Meters and data management, system conductors/cables, distribution transformers, Pre-Paid Meters and Poles
- b) Procurement of works, supply and installation contracts
- c) Procurement of consultancy services for design, works supervision, studies and services
- d) Procurement of private sector investor to develop minigrids in selected off grid sites under public-private partnership arrangements.

Procurement of contracts financed by the World Bank will be conducted through the procedures as specified in the World Bank's <u>Guidelines: Procurement under IBRD Loans and IDA Credits</u> (January 2011, Revised July 2014) and is open to all eligible bidders as defined in the guidelines. Consulting services will be selected in accordance with the World Bank's <u>Guidelines: Selection and Employment of Consultants by World Bank Borrowers</u> (January 2011, Revised July 2014).

Specific procurement notices for contracts to be bid under the World Bank's international competitive bidding (ICB) procedures and for contracts for consultancy services will be announced, as they become available, in <u>UN Development Business</u>, <u>dgMarket</u> and in local newspapers.
